Types of Figurative Language

Alliteration is the repetition of the initial consonant There should be at least two repetitions in a row Example: Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers The first letter, p, is a consonant Its sound is repeated many times Onomatopoeia is the imitation of natural sounds in word form These words
